HISTORY MUSEUM OF MOBILE TO SPONSOR READING OF MLK, JR.'S 'LETTER FROM BIRMINGHAM JAIL'

The History Museum of Mobile will sponsor a public reading of Martin Luther King Jr.'s "Letter from Birmingham Jail" on April 17 at 11 a.m. in the Museum auditorium.

The reading will happen before a special noontime Learning Lunch titled, "Martin Luther King, Spring Hill College, and the Letter from Birmingham Jail."

April marks the 50th anniversary of the letter King wrote while incarcerated in Birmingham, and the public reading is part of a global initiative by the Birmingham Public Library to read King's letter in public venues all over the world.

King's "Letter from Birmingham Jail" remains one of the most evocative documents from the modern civil rights era. Begun as a rebuttal to the advice of several white religious leaders in Birmingham, who had publicly urged King to adopt a more peaceable and gradual approach in the city's demonstrations, the letter has endured as one of the best examples of protest literature in the 20th century.

Fifteen readers of various backgrounds will read aloud parts of the letter. During a portion of the reading, an interpreter will recite parts of the letter in Spanish. An American Sign Language instructor will sign a portion of the letter, as well.
