February 8, 2023 Learning Lunch Program at the History Museum of Mobile will feature Steve Joynt, Journalist and Editor of Mobile Mask Magazine, and the Excelsior Band

The History Museum of Mobile's next Learning Lunch Program will take place on Wednesday, February 8, 2023 at 12pm and will feature Steve Joynt, Journalist and Editor of the *Mobile Mask* magazine. He will do a presentation on *The Curious Tale of Mobile's Twin Queens of 1941*. After the presentation, the Excelsior Band will perform a medley of Mardi Gras music.

Steve Joynt has been a professional journalist for nearly 40 years. His path started as a copy boy for his hometown newspaper, the *News Leader*, in Richmond Virginia. He double-majored in English lit and American government at the University of Virginia but spent more time working at the *Cavalier Daily* than he did on his actual studies. He earned a master's degree in journalism at Columbia University in New York City. He spent 15 years as a reporter for the *Birmingham Post-Herald*, winning several awards and being named to the Scripps Howard Hall of Fame. He then spent 11 years with the *Mobile Press Register* as an assistant city editor. He left the Register in late 2011 to start the *Mobile Mask* web site and magazine. The web site has received four Nappie awards over the years, and this year marks the eleventh annual issue of the magazine. Through *Mobile Mask*, Steve has had three Mardi Grasrelated historic markers placed in the city, including the one on Royal Street, just outside this building.

The Excelsior Band is an African American brass marching band that has embodied the culture of the city of Mobile and its beloved Mardi Gras celebration for many generations. It was originally organized as a firehouse band by John A. Pope in 1883. Today, it is a ten-piece marching brass band that consists of three trumpets, three saxophones, one trombone, a tuba, a bass drum and a snare drum. The band plays many genres of music with emphasis on Dixieland and conventional jazz and is well known for performing in and leading Mardi Gras parades.

The History Museum of Mobile invites the public to attend the free Learning Lunch lecture series. Guests are encouraged to bring their lunch and enjoy a presentation on an historical or cultural topic.
