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## HISTORY MUSEUM WELCOMES OVER 10,000 VISITORS TO EGYPTIAN MUMMIES & ETERNAL LIFE EXHIBITION

The History Museum of Mobile's latest traveling exhibition, "Egyptian Mummies & Eternal Life," surpassed 10,000 visitors over the weekend. Additionally, over 1,000 people attended the First Free Sunday in June bringing in the museum's highest attendance numbers since the pandemic began.

This exhibition, on loan from the National Archeological Museum of Florence, Italy, made its US debut at the History Museum of Mobile in late February. Within the United States, it will only be on view in Mobile and will return to Italy upon closing at the History Museum. Artifacts on display range from 2,000 to 4,000 years old and focus on how the process of mummification and entombment prepared the deceased for the afterlife.
