JULY LEARNING LUNCH AT THE HISTORY MUSEUM OF MOBILE WILL FEATURE DIRECTOR OF THE BELLINGRATH HOME AND COLUMNIST FOR MOBILE BAY MONTHLY, MR. TOM MCGEHEE

The History Museum of Mobile's Learning Lunch Program is on Wednesday, July 13, at 12pm and will feature Director of the Bellingrath Home and Columnist for Mobile Bay Monthly Magazine, Mr. Tom McGehee. He will discuss the world of Mobile, Alabama before Air Conditioning.

Since 1994 Tom McGehee has served as Museum Director for Bellingrath Gardens and Home, overseeing the collections and archives housed in the 15 room Bellingrath Home. He currently serves on the boards of the Friends of the Alabama Governor's Mansion, the Friends of Magnolia Cemetery, the Historic Mobile Preservation Society, the Historic Restoration Society (Cotton Hall), the Rotary Club of Mobile and the Rotary Children's Foundation. He has written about Mobile's history with an emphasis on its architectural losses for more than 35 years and has been a regular columnist for Mobile Bay Magazine with his "Ask McGehee" series for over 15 years. For the past 8 years he has appeared weekly each Thursday on NBC 15's Gulf Coast Today with a segment of "Lost Mobile."
